I am proud to share that ISRN supported, a women-based FPO-Kamalapur Fed Farmer Producer Company in Sitapur, processed 20 quintals of premium, chemical-free arhar dal using traditional methods, showcasing how sustainable livelihoods, women-led enterprises and indigenous knowledge can come together for health, nutrition, and economic empowerment at the grassroots.



In a moment of great pride, ISRN received the **Best NGO Award in Agricultural Innovation** at the 12th National Seminar on Futuristic Agriculture held in Umiam, Meghalaya. This prestigious recognition, jointly organized by Mobilization and Central Agricultural University, ICAR-NEH Region, and ICAR-ATARI (Assam), affirms our growing contribution in strengthening rural livelihoods and promoting sustainable farming practices across India.

Our team continued to engage at the national level, with my representation of ISRN as a panelist at the **National Seminar on Digital Empowerment of Rural Women**, organized by BIMTECH and ICSSR in collaboration with ISDM. The insights were provided on digital inclusion, and NGO-led transformation added strength to the discourse on equity and accessibility in rural India.

ISRN also proudly participated in the World Health Summit Regional Meeting 2025 at Bharat Mandapam, New Delhi. Our participation offered us the opportunity to engage with global leaders on critical themes like climate-resilient health systems, emergency preparedness, and health equity, reaffirming our commitment to contributing to a resilient and inclusive public health landscape.

On the education front, the Uttam School Initiative progressed further through **robust partnerships with IRCTC and Rahee Infratech**, with renewed efforts in Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand to transform rural schools into inclusive, child-friendly learning environments.

Formation & Promotion of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs)

Savoring Tradition: Women FPO Members Lead Chemical-Free Dal Processing in Sitapur

In a powerful showcase of tradition-driven innovation, a women-based FPO named Kamalapur Fed Farmer Producer Company Limited in Kasmanda Block, Sitapur (Uttar Pradesh) have successfully processed 20 quintals of premium-quality arhar (pigeon pea) dal, completely free from chemicals and artificial polish.

Supported by ISRN, the FPO adopted a traditional, manual processing method that begins with carefully selecting whole arhar grains. These were roasted in iron pans to naturally loosen the husk and enhance the aroma. Once cooled, the grains were manually dehusked and split using hand-operated stone grinders (chakki), ensuring the dal retains its authentic texture, rich flavor, and nutritional value.



This initiative delivers more than just a nutritious, protein-rich product—it reflects the strength of community-based enterprises and the impact of women-led agricultural practices grounded in sustainability and health. Local consumers have praised the dal for its purity and health benefits, reaffirming the value of traditional food practices.

ISRN remains dedicated to nurturing rural enterprises that celebrate heritage, health, and women's participation in sustainable livelihoods.




Swasth Jeevan Express

A Mobile Health Unit (MMU) Initiative: Driving Healthcare to the Last Mile with CONCOR

In a transformative move toward bridging the healthcare divide, ISRN, with the generous support of Container Corporation of India Ltd. (CONCOR), under its CSR initiative, has launched the Swasth Jeevan Express—a state-of-the-art Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) in Ballia, one of Uttar Pradesh's Aspirational Districts.

This initiative is taking primary healthcare directly to the doorsteps of communities living in remote, underserved villages—where accessing even basic medical services often remains a challenge.




The 2025 regional meeting continued this legacy by focusing on critical themes such as:

- Overcoming global engagement challenges with CoNGO's support



Nature's Guardian Writes: Mr. Jagat Kinkhabwala, The Sparrow Man (Governing Board Member-ISRN)

How many times have you heard for a girl, 'She talks a lot and is like a Myna! Common Myna / Marathi: Solonaki / Telugu: Goranka

Myna is a beautiful bird in structure, voice and appearance. It is capable of exactly mimicking the sounds of many other birds. Its sounds are clear and beautiful. The surprising thing is that many people in many countries keep the myna in cages at home. Myna is a very agile, active and efficient bird. It becomes very aggressive for its own protection, for its mates, for the preservation of the nest site and for its territory. It is considered among the most aggressive birds in the world, which is surprising considering its regular presence around you.



In India, 17 birds are known as common birds found all over the country which live around human settlements. Myna is one of the 17 common birds. It is found almost everywhere in South Asia and India. This bird is found all over Gujarat and India in open turfs, fields and near human settlements. It is also found on offshore islands including the Middle East, South Africa, Israel, North America, Australia, New Zealand and Hawaii. According to historians, Mynas migrated from Asia and Europe to Africa. It is impossible to move it from its nesting place and it never leaves its territory. While number of many birds have decreased and are rarely seen, the myna has managed to sustain its existence in the changed environment.

The Myna is 25 cm in length and its head, neck and upper chest are black. The rest of the body colour is brown, which is darker on the back and paler on the underside. The tail is white on the bottom. Its rounded tail is black and white at the tip. The eyes of the myna are very beautiful and are brown in colour, the bill and the soft folds that come below and behind the eyes are yellow and the legs are yellow. The combination of black and yellow colour makes it wink as if someone as embellished it! Its legs are very strong.

If you see a Myna walk, you will notice swag in it, as if an artist is walking. It does not hop on two legs while walking but instead walks with one foot behind the other.





Male and female Mynas are so similar in appearance that it is difficult to tell them apart. But when a female Myna conceives, its body size increases and it becomes easy to identify it. Its weight is around 120 to 140 grams. Its life span is 12 to 15 years. After mating, male and female Mynas always maintain their relationship and both stay faithful to each other for life. When you see a cluster of Mynas, you will see couples moving close to each other. Mynas love their partner incomparably and remain loyal.

Its nesting season starts from April to August. It nests in trees, walls, bridges, mud nests or well cavities. It uses roots, twigs and fabricated materials like thread, paper, plastic etc. for making its nest. It lays 4 to 6 bright blue eggs. Looking at the colour of the eggs, it is surprising that it differs so much from the colour of myna. The male and female work together from incubating the eggs to raising the chicks, and one of the two constantly guards the nest. Even in the dark of the night it guards the nest.



Starling Myna is an omnivorous bird. It also eats grains, fruits, and insects and occasionally eats leftovers near human settlements. It also eats insects from grasslands, lizards, small snakes, bird eggs and chicks, and grass insects. It catches and eats grasshoppers flying as well as from the ground. They can eat different types of food like dates, apples, bananas, and nectar from the flower. It wipes out the crops from the field on a large scale. This is of the reasons why it does not die of hunger. Its aggressiveness helps it to get food and it is a selfish bird.

When aggravated, the Myna has a hoarse voice, when seeing the danger like a snake or a cat, it gives out a warning call, which is called 'Chadavo' in the native language, which makes other birds and humans also alert. However, this bird knows how to imitate the speech of others very well and it enjoys this art of mimicry very much.
